Message from the President

Dear Lot Owners and Friends of Oakdale:

Oakdale Cemetery continues to be active in so very many ways. Thanks to all of you who are Friends of Oakdale, many activities and improvements are "on-going" – fence restoration on orphaned lots, our new website and angel repair to mention a few.

Unfortunately, your board has authorized an increase in internment fees in April. Our last increase of this sort was back in March of 2001. This was necessary because the cost of maintaining the grounds and rising cost of EVERYTHING. If you are interested in helping your cemetery, one way is to make a tax deductible donation to the cemetery by filling out the form on the back of this newsletter. Our Superintendent continues to do an outstanding job of maintaining our grounds. We are indeed extremely fortunate to have a gentleman of Mr. Kozen's knowledge and expertise with us.

We are in the process of planning an area in Oakdale for cremations. As I know you are aware, there is a strong trend for this type of burial. In 2006 we found that 37% of the burials were cremations. We certainly want to make available what you would be interested in having as a last resting place. If you are interested and wish to voice some ideas, please let us know. Also many people have said they have been told Oakdale is full and we have no more space. This is NOT true, we do have space (not in the old section) and more land that can be developed in the future.

In the near future you will be better able to locate sections as section signs will soon appear in the old section and Live Oak section (opened in 1992). These will be helpful to lot owners as well as visitors. With the help of an Eagle Scout, these will be placed hopefully before the year end. These scouts have done many projects at Oakdale and we have benefited greatly from each of them.

The Board was very sorry to receive the resignation of Dr. Chris Fonvielle, Jr.. We do appreciate his time with us and his knowledge of not only Wilmington but Oakdale as well. We welcome to the board, Mr. Thomas Wolfe and look forward to working with him.

SUMMER CAMP



On June 21st, the Lower Cape Fear Historical Society conducted their annual summer camp for summer vacationing school kids. This year as part of the summer camp they came to tour Oakdale Cemetery and learn some of the history. On this day they were told the stories of Rose O'Neale Greenhow, Mrs. Eliza DeRossett, Miss Amy Bradley, and Dr. James Henderson Dickson. Our very own Superintendent told the life of Dr. Dickson and his efforts to comfort the patients who were stricken with Yellow Fever in 1862. Dr. Dickson would soon follow in his patients' path and become one of the many to die from this epidemic that killed 43% of the population in Wilmington.



WATER USAGE

Please be aware that the use of water comes with a cost to the cemetery. Per the Rules and Regulations, the watering of lots must not be used for more than 1 hour at any one time, nor left unattended with the exception of a properly installed and monitored sprinkler systems. With the recent drought we are experiencing this spring

into summer, many lots have been left unattended while being watered. Please understand that our water supply comes from the City of Wilmington, and these incidents have created an increase in our water bill. If lots are found unattended without the aid of a sprinkler system, the water will be turned off.

A STONE OF INTEREST

This stone is located in a Special Plot for strangers in Section H. The stone is inscribed in German. Catherine Thorsen had died aboard a vessel the Norwegian Bark

Rosenberg in Southport whom her husband was Captain of. She actually died December 23, 1890 and her stone reads the year 1891. The stone translates as:

Here rests in god, our dear Daughter C. Thorsen Born Kroger Born 26 D. 1866 in Stavanger Died 23 D. 1891 Dedicated from her parents

DR. CHRIS FONVIELLE, JR. RESIGNS

WATCHING OVER HIM AGAIN

For some time now the angel that stood over the grave of William Lovell Hooper who died on March 7, 1857 at the tender age of 22 had been damaged more than once. Back in October 2004 was the final blow to this angel. It was evident that this angel had been repaired in the past when the wings were damaged, but the vandalism of 2004 broke the angel into several more pieces. Since the angel had some prior damage and there were no descendants to contact, it was decided that a replica should be made. Both The Oakdale Cemetery Board and the Friends of Oakdale covered the cost of a new angel. Mr. Robert Mihaly of Durham North Carolina was contracted to perform this duty in December of 2006. Mrs. Janet Seapker, President of the Friends of Oakdale gladly obliged to take the remaining parts of the angel to Mr. Mihaly at an arranged meeting in Raleigh so he would have some idea of its size and style. Mrs. Seapker was also gracious enough to have pictures of the head intact before it disappeared so Mr. Mihaly could replicate its likeness. On May 14, 2007 Mr. Mihaly returned with the angel and personally came to Oakdale to place the angel back into its proper place. Now, once again, William Lovell Hooper has an angel watching over him.
