



Road Repairs

The white stripe which aids people from the main entrance to the bridge and Annex was also repainted. -

No shrinking violet, she cultivated important people from Gen. George Meade with whom she shared a house to Frederick Law Olmstead who directed her activities on the transports to Ralph Waldo Emerson who attended her retirement party.

When she came to Wilmington on a snowy day at the end of 1866, she received an icy welcome although members of the Kidder, Chadbourn, Martin and French families did support her efforts and within time the



community recognized that this tiny woman had the ability to move mountains and she did - her crowning achievement was the Tileston School. Many local citizens came to recognize that despite her Yankee notions Miss Bradley dispensed a superior education, an education that would benefit their children and so her school thrived.

After her retirement, everyone assumed she'd return North but Wilmington had won her heart and it was in the brown cottage on the Tileston School grounds where she died.

Her death merited front page headlines and a lengthy obituary. She lay in state beneath a floral pall

that read "Our School Mother" at Tileston, hundreds attended her funeral. Her nephew said that her hometown cemetery was no more - a total fabrication - so she was given a twelve person plot at Oakdale crowned with and impressive marker inscribed again with the quaint epitaph "Our School Mother". The valedictorian at New Hanover High School is awarded the Amy Bradley Medal*.

Goethe once wrote "A teacher affects eternity. One never knows where his influence stops."

Perhaps some of Amy's influence may be found in the Capitol's Lincoln Memorial. Its architect Henry Bacon was one of Amy's "scholars" and he spent many an hour absorbing her tributes to the President she so revered.

*NHHS former principal Robert Moore tells me that there is no official list of the honorees. I know that the late Miriam Miller Warshauer was one as was Mr. Charles Harrington's daughter, Nancy Stovall (Horton) and in more recent times Wade Tillery III, Andrew Boney, John Strawn and Lauren Collins.

Mrs. Diane Cashman won her fourth Clarendon Award for Headstrong, her long out of print biography of Amy Morris Bradley.

The Symbolic Lily Flower

The Easter Lily is one of the most widely used flowers at not only a funeral but also adorning gravestones. You will find many of them in Oakdale Cemetery upon the stones in many different forms. Most popular are on the cross in





a full bouquet showing their splendor. The Easter Lily symbolizes purity with its pure unblemished white color and can be extended to attaining spiritual qualities. The lily can also symbolize the Resurrection since it returns every year as a perennial flower in our gardens.

The lily is also widely used on monuments to show that ones life has been cut short. As we tend to flowers in our gardens, we nurture these flowering plants such as a lily to produce such a magnificent flower in the Spring to one day find the stem has been broken before it has reached its greatest potential. This intentional break of the flower stem can be seen on many monuments depicting the tragic loss of ones life that has been cut short.
